Third Sunday of Easter, Year C

Psalter Week 3

The Shawshank Redemption was the hit film of 1994. In it we follow the incarceration and escape plans of Tim Robbins and Morgan Freeman. Robbins is condemned to life imprisonment for the murder of his wife and her lover. Freeman says he is the 'only guilty man in Shawshank Prison'. Based on Stephen King's novella, this uplifting film is a surprise package from a writer whose fame comes from the horror genre. The longer we watch the film, the more we realise that Stephen King has modelled his story on the Gospel of John. It is, in many respects a more modern parable about John's portrait of Jesus. Tim Robbins' character, Andy, like Jesus, is an innocent man, treated harshly by the authorities of his day. He has to endure the condemnation and cruelty of the leading religious zealots who are keepers of law and order, while he inspires others to think of a world free of subjection and oppression where they can be free to live the life of which they dream. Like John's Jesus, Andy has big dreams and often talks in riddles, but he leaves clues for others to follow him in their quest for freedom. In the last part of the film, after Andy has successfully escaped and the governor of the prison has been exposed for the hypocrite he is, Freeman is paroled after serving 35 years hard labour. He decides to go where Andy has gone and, just as Andy promised when they were together in prison, he finds that Andy has prepared the way for him to follow. The moving climax of the film comes as Robbins and Freeman meet on a beach, embrace each other and share food and drink to

celebrate the new life both of them have discovered.

Stephen King understands John's portrait of Jesus very well. For all of Jesus' assuredness and composure throughout the Gospel, the sense of care and intimacy in the encounters with his friends is deeply moving. In the Easter Gospel to which we have just listened, Jesus returns to where his friends have fled from Jerusalem. In a parable about the growing numbers of the early Church, the Eucharist and the suffering they are enduring, John reaffirms that Jesus is intimately present in their following of him and their suffering for the Kingdom. The only sense John can make of Jesus' death, the martyrdom of the apostles or the persecution of the early church is to see them all as acts of love. 'No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.'

Those of us who have been caught up in the net of God's love are heirs to the same promises of Jesus' fidelity. Christ is intimately present to us in every act of loving sacrifice we undertake for him. He continues to send us out to tell people of the place that has been prepared for them at the banquet of life and he gives us strength to gird our loins for the times when life takes us to places we would rather not go. In this Eucharist let's be grateful for this Easter season when we celebrate again that we have been set free from the prison of our fears and shown the way to live a life of sacrificial love and undeserved redemption.

# The Just Word

Mercy in Relationships: Mercy, like charity, begins at home.

Playwrights and screenwriters say that the best dramatic tension is created between characters who know each other very well—the deeper and more long-lasting the relationship, the greater the potential for conflict. Two of Shakespeare's greatest tragedies, Hamlet and King Lear, are stories of family breakdown. The most popular and enduring sit-coms are about people who feel they have known each other for too long: think of

Seinfeld or The Big Bang Theory.

People in close relationships can spark forest fires of animosity because the fuel has been building up for some time—in an imperfect world where we are all flawed, our weaknesses are most irritating to those who must put up with them every day.

But if the greatest conflicts can arise in the closest relationships, so too can the most wondrous experiences of mercy. For these to occur, we need always to remember each other's humanity, and to ponder that humanity with

compassion. She's our annoying workmate? She's also a human being struggling with her regrets from the past and her fears for the future. He's our aggravating neighbour? Ditto—what are the troubles that he faces, hidden from our shallow, judgemental view? Compassion, then, can lead to mercy; mercy is compassion in action; and mercy, not just charity, begins at home.

# Going Fishing by Fr Michael Tate

'I am going fishing' – truly remarkable words from Peter.

Consider the situation. He, and a number of other disciples, men and women, had been granted an appearance of the Risen Lord.

Yet Peter and six of the other male disciples decided that that was quarantined history – over and done with. They go back to their trade, go back to their old way of life. They lack the courage to transform their lives in the light of the resurrection: 'We're going fishing.' It was back to business as usual.

It is a reminder of how easy it is for us, after the elation and faithful celebration of Easter, to revert to the way of life we are accustomed to, treating the Risen Lord as absent. Are we very different to Peter? Do we quarantine the presence of the Risen Lord in our lives to an hour at Mass? And then: 'We're going fishing.'

Our Lord is not against our 'fishing', whatever it may be: work, study, sport, good relations with someone. But, he wants to be involved.

Our Lord simply wants to be with us to ensure that, at the end of the day, we don't find things rather empty. He wants us to be full of good things to the point of bursting.

He gives us two helps along the way.

First, as with Peter and the other six disciples, he invites us to a sacred meal at which his presence is particularly real.

Second, and this is what I want to focus on, Our Lord establishes a community with Peter to shepherd it.

The threefold response of Peter: 'Yes, you know I love you', undoubtedly balances his threefold denial of any association with Our Lord: 'I do not know the man.' That denial was just at the point when Jesus began his final journey as the victim.

It is very clear that some of the clergy and some bishops have effectively denied Christ either by their abuse of vulnerable people, or by cover-up afterwards.

There has not been enough love of Our Lord who is present in, even present as, the suffering victims whose lives have been blighted. 'Whatever you did to these least you did to me'!

In the light of this fact, the Pope, successor of St Peter, cannot simply 'go fishing'. It cannot be back to 'business as usual'.

Pope Francis has ordered the relevant Holy See authorities to vigorously deal with the phenomenon of sexual abuse. He has insisted on due proceedings against the guilty. He requires the Church to provide pastoral assistance to those who have suffered abuse.

On the national level, the Australian Church has promised full cooperation with the Royal Commission, and yet, on the part of some, there are still instances of lack of compassion and justice in response to survivors of abuse and their families.

The Church's only hope of being well-shepherded through this crisis lies in Pope Francis being able to answer the challenge of the Risen Lord using the same words as St Peter, 'Lord, you know everything; you know I love You.'

'I love You', more than the institution, more than prestige, more than pain for the Church which is nothing compared with the pain suffered by the victims of abuse.

Pope Francis needs to be surrounded by our prayers. Let us pray that he will always act as a shepherd who knows how to love, who knows who to love.

Who to love? The *victims* of sexual abuse embodied in Christ the *Victim*.

Christ the Victim. Yes, Jesus Christ is the Risen Lord, as we have just celebrated this Easter. But he is the Risen Lord too evidently still bearing wounds in His Body.



In today's Gospel, Jesus tells Peter again and again, "If you love Me, feed my sheep." He says the same to each of us, "If you love Me, use the gifts I have given you to serve your brothers and sisters."
